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when we older, we had mutual friends in
London & often met. I missed you both, I think
when I stayed in Uppingham during WW II
in aid of the Red Cross, but by then I had
heard what a wonderful teacher she was.
As for you, my pupils even enjoyed their
exams, because you were so kind & understanding
to them!

What seemed the strangest of the many
odd connections other than friendships and
acquaintances that grew up in the Winchester days,
was that your letter mentioned Eva Schloss.
As you probably know from past years international
publicity, Otto Frank, Anne's father, was a very
special cousin of mine. On his way back from
Auschwitz he met Frieda Gieringer & her daughter
Eva in Russian Poland. They were Viennese refugees
being evacuated by the Russians & returned to Holland.
Like the Franks, they had lost their beloved husband and
brother and became friends & later after Eva had
married in England, they married and Eva's
children brought them the grandchildren that
Otto had always wanted. Frieda is a darling and
Eva came to our house in London & I've known her for
"decades". She wrote a wonderful book about the
camp, called "Eva's story". It's published as paperback.
Yes, Buddy Frank is Anne's first cousin. He is a
famous actor now, and never uses his real name, Benjamin.

Actually, I am sure I must have written to explain things to Cassie when Maurice's health made it impossible for him to continue to come to London.

I am so glad I saw you all on your steps in Scotland when we talked on the phone and you called me there on my last visit in 1990. (I mentioned your call in my book "Looking Back at 90") so my last memory of Jane is with you all and smiling.

But we have a wonderful link over here through a pupil she sent me, Nathan Davis. Oddly enough I received a lovely card from him on

Today's post box⁴ He is now Music Director
at Moorhead State University, Minnesota and
plays beautifully. None of us, including Maurice,
thought he ought to be a professional as his
hands and arms were so heavy, but he has
somehow conquered these problems. I wish
you + Jane could have heard him. So I have
to thank you both for my favorite American
pupil.

Please give my warmest greetings and
deep sympathy to all your family + all
mutual friends. I wonder if you still have
my old Steinway or if it too old (over
100 years!) to survive.
